More than 500 artists submitted works for the 2022 show, with 118 selected for inclusion, 50 of which made the trip to the Hansen Museum as part of the traveling exhibition. We loved seeing all the families enjoying the Museum during the **Animal Super Powers** exhibition.





### 1930'S DANCE & BALL ROOM MUSIC


November 12th at 2:30 p.m. in the Community Room
